**Acknowledging Our Roots** in Shawville, Quebec







In November 2024, the SRPC hosted the inaugural Mini Rural and Remote Medicine Conference in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, co-chaired by Dr. Sarah Lespérance and Dr. Fraser Mackay. This condensed version of our main event is designed to bring rural medical education, collaboration, and connection directly to smaller communities, ensuring that more regions of the country can participate in a meaningful way.

The first Mini R&R successfully attracted local physicians, residents, and medical students, creating a vibrant space for learning, networking, and community impact. By focusing on a smaller scale, the conference allowed for deeper engagement, hands-on experiences, and tangible benefits for the host community.

Our plan moving forward is to host a Mini R&R each fall, strategically located on the opposite side of the country from the spring R&R conference, continuing to foster education, collaboration, and support for rural physicians and their communities.



### New website launched: SRPC.CA

This year, we launched a new WordPress website at srpc.ca, giving us more tools to grow content, promote programs, and organize information for the rural medical community. ### **Journal Activity in 2024**

In 2024, the journal continued to attract strong engagement from authors, with 91 submissions received. Of these, 39 manuscripts were accepted, and 31 articles were published throughout the year.

Our published work included a diverse mix of content:


### **National Rural Health Week**






### **Membership Report**

- Many physicians who joined during the 2023–2024 training program chose not to continue after it ended.




Even with this adjustment, membership has grown by over 60% since 2020.

We are confident in our continued growth and proud that our data now reflects a truly active community.


### **Regional Membership Distribution**
